BOOKS FOR STUDENTS

Jeremy Draws a Monster

Peter McCarty

A book about a boy who draws a monster that comes to life, intended for children in kindergarten to grade one.

Where the Wild Things Are

Maurice Sendak

A book about a monster, Max, who angrily leaves home to be king of his own fantasy land where he can be as terrible as he wishes. A story for 3-5 years olds who also wrestle with human nature's wild emotions.

Scary Stories to Tell in the Dark

Alvin Schwartz

Intended for children ages 10 and up, this book is filled with short scary tales and songs to peak the imagination.

Frankenstein

Mary Shelley

A novel about a young scientist who creates a grotesque but perceptive creature in an unconventional experiment, appropriate for ages 10 and up.

The Complete Tales and Poems

Edgar Allen Poe

These tales and poems, appropriate for middle schooler and up, are centered on psychological horror and are known for having revolutionized modern poetics.

Bleak House

Charles Dickens

Dickens used this legal-case mishap story to satirize the English judicial system. This novel is appropriate for high school students. Oliver Twist Charles Dickens

A story of an orphan, this book exposed the cruel treatment of orphans and the squalid lives of criminals during the mid-19th century.

On Monsters: An Unnatural History of our Worst Fears Asma, Stephen T.

For high school students, this is a wide-ranging cultural and conceptual history of monsters. How they evolved, what functions they have served for us, and what shapes they may take in the future.

GUILLERMO DEL TORO FILMS

Cronos

A 1993 Mexican horror film, featuring a surreal twist on the classic vampire tale. Rated R.

The Devil's Backbone

Carlos, a 12-year-old orphan, discovers that his school holds many haunted secrets in this 2001 Spanish-Mexican gothic horror film. Rated R.

Hellboy

A demonic beast turns superhero in this 2004 American supernatural superhero film. Rated PG-13.

Hellboy II

A fantasy-based sequel to Hellboy (2004). Rated PG-13.

Pan's Labyrinth

This haunting fantasy-drama, released in 2006, occurs in the aftermath of Spanish Civil War and details the journey of a little girl who escapes into her own eerie yet gripping fantasy world. Rated R.

Pacific Rim

A former pilot and a trainee pair up to fight legions of monstrous creatures. Released in 2013, rated PG-13.

Crimson Peak

A Gothic romance film. Released in 2015, rated R.

Sleeping Beauty Walt Disney An animated Disney film with designs by Guillermo del Toro favorite Eyvind Earle.

Frankenstein James Whale A monster film inspired by Mark Shelly's novel.
