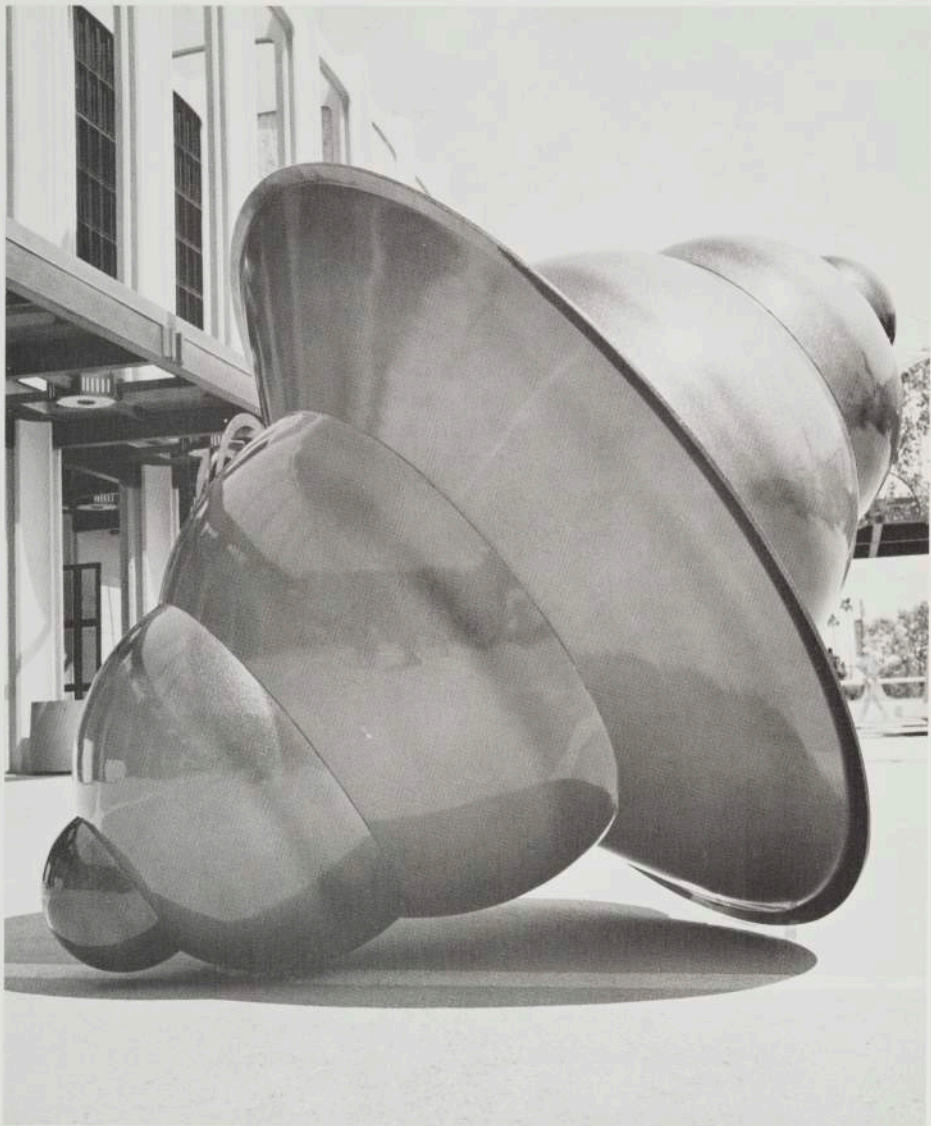

In 1966 Burt Kleiner approached the Museum and offered us a collection of contemporary art on indefinite loan with the provision that I select the works to be included. I readily agreed since Mr. Kleiner—already well known to us as a generous donor of paintings by Gorky, Brauner, and other modern artists—made clear that all the works acquired could be treated as if they were museum property: loaned to other institutions at our discretion, and publicly exhibited or held in reserve according to our needs. Further, it was suggested that such a collection might well become a donation to the Museum at a later time. This relationship worked well in the last years of the Sixties, allowing the Department of Modern Art to display key painting and sculpture that would not otherwise have been available to us. Now the Kleiner Foundation has donated the entire California portion of the collection to the Museum, along with one of the most popular contemporary works ever shown here—the mirror glass environmental labyrinth of New York artist Lucas Samaras.

The gift of California art provides us with certain high achievements of the past decade. All of the works were chosen by me specifically to complement the Museum collection and to fill in outstanding omissions, although many still remain. This selection was also made in concert with the on-going acquisitions of the Contemporary Art Council. The Kleiner Foundation gift is the most important donation of contemporary art ever made by an individual to the Museum. It encourages us to hope that other far-sighted benefactors will come forth and continue to assist the CAC in the support and presentation of contemporary art.

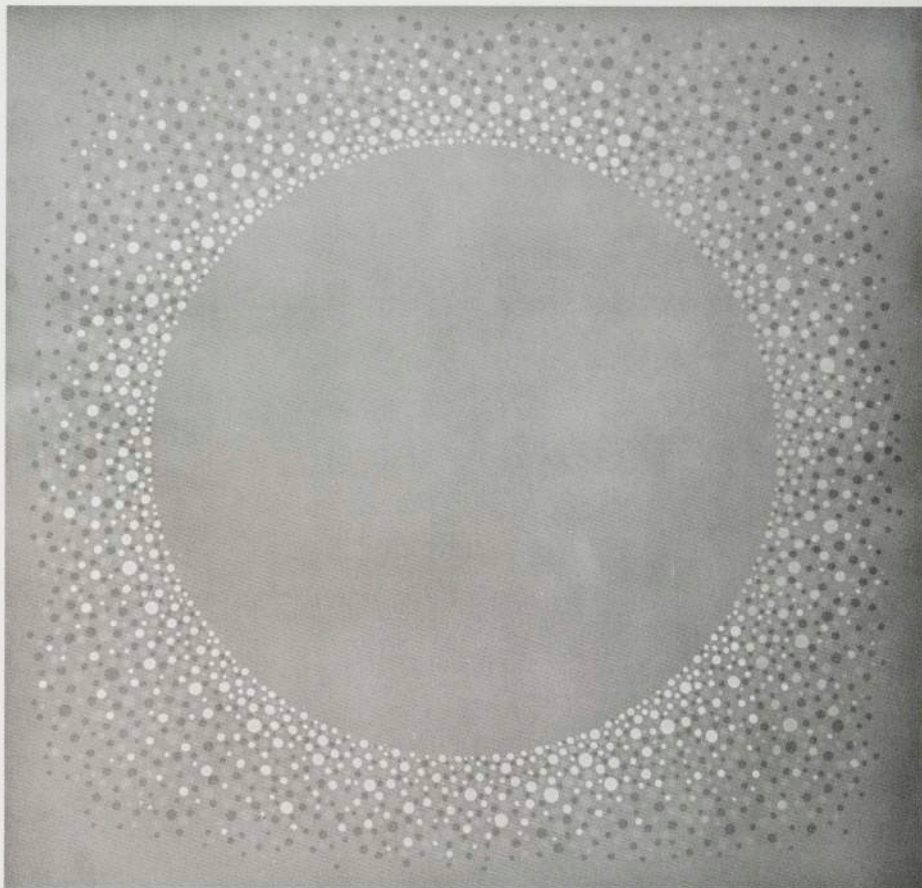

Relief*

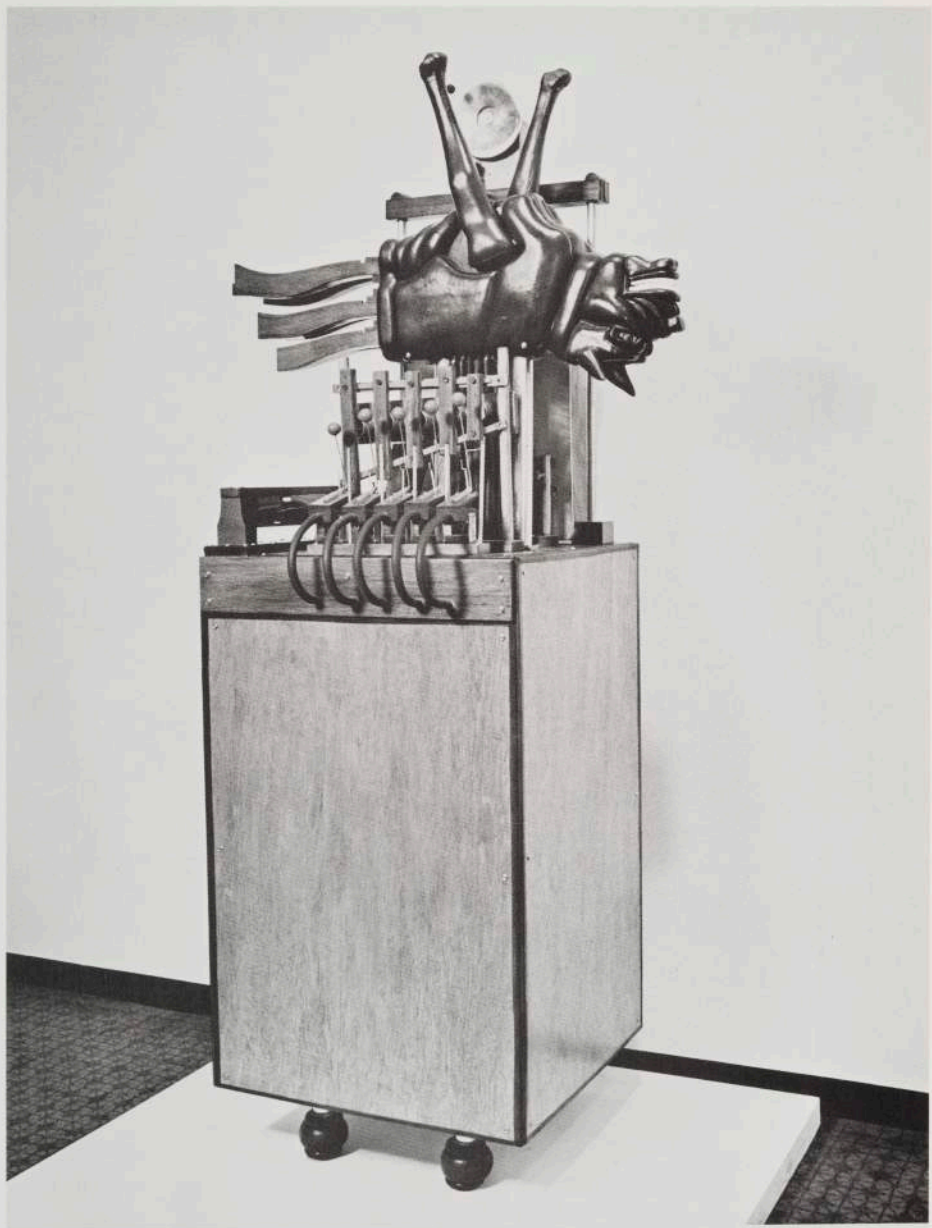
