VOUR CHEST? IN YOUR CHEST?



If you answered "rib cage, lungs, heart, stuff like that," I like you. Sit next to me. But the chest I'm talking about is like the one pictured above, which is in LACMA's exhibition *Archive of the World: Art and Imagination in Spanish America*, 1500–1800.

This chest was made in Colombia hundreds of years ago. It's made out of wood with a silver lock and hinges. The outside is decorated with paintings of animals, flowers, and mythical creatures.

Take a close look and see if you can find dragons, lions, unicorns, mermaids, monkeys, and birds. Did you notice that they are in symmetrical pairs? That means there are two of each creature, and they are opposite one another. The flowers and foliage tie the whole design together.

While you look carefully, do you notice the silver lines in the images? Those were made with silver leaf, which is paper-thin sheets of silver that helped the box sparkle. Over the centuries, this chest has aged and darkened. It is coated with a special varnish made with resin from the mopa mopa tree, which grows where this chest was made and has helped the decorations to last over time.




Maybe you already have a treasure chest. It could be something handmade by an artist, or a nice box that once held soap, cookies, or cigars. Even a cardboard box can be turned into a special object.

If you have a plain box, you can decorate it with collage, fabric, or drawings. Sometimes while you are designing the outside of a chest, it helps you figure out what you are going to put inside it.
